

APPR Process Will Be Fine-Tuned This Summer

As another school year draws to a close we can reflect on Arlington's second year of involvement in the APPR process. Last summer a small committee of ATA members representing different subjects and grade levels met with ad-

ministrators to hash out an APPR agreement that would be the best possible for our members while still adhering to the rigid requirements from the state. While we believe that we succeeded in this goal we can now finetune the agreement after seeing it in practice for a full school year.

All ATA members were recently given the opportunity to give their feedback about the implementation of the APPR process, either by meeting at the ATA office or through email. Of the 718 current ATA members, approximately 30 participated. All of their concerns will be taken into consideration when meeting with Superintendent Brendan Lyons over the summer.

These include:

 Setting up a process whereby teachers approve all locally-written pre- and posttests they must administer to ensure that material assessed on the tests corresponds with what is covered Requiring that no observations take place within two weeks of the start of a new class

We would like to thank everyone who offered their feedback on the APPR process.

We are a large organization and it is imperative that we have active participation from a wide range of members in order to effectively represent all of them. In the end, we are all educators and we are

"Copies of this agreement shall be printed at Board expense and a copy given to each teacher. The District shall provide the Association with an electronic copy of this Agreement."

Explanation: This provision (Article XXIV, page 39) states that all ATA members should receive a printed copy of any new contract. In addition, the district must provide an electronic version, which is then posted on the ATA's web page. Members have not yet received their copy of the June 2012 contract agreement because some details of it were not finalized until this month. The agreement has finally been signed by both the ATA and the district and printed copies should be available by September.

The Volunteer Recognition Awards reception took place at the Henry Wallace Visitor and Education Center at the FDR Library in Hyde Park. In addition to accepting plagues for serving as school captains in the district's Cram the Classroom project, the women each received Dutchess Outreach's Extra Mile award for their work getting donations and coordinating volunteers to serve meals at the Lunch Box, Dutchess Outreach's food pantry.

According to Carol Beck, Dutchess Outreach's Volunteer Administrator, "The Cram the Classroom drive couldn't have taken place at a better time. We had a difficult time keeping food on our food

Rally Brings Thousands to Albany

I was one of the approximately 30 ATA members who attended the One Voice Rally in Albany on June 8 along with the thousands more who gathered. It was invigorating to stand shoulder to shoulder with so many others who are ready to proclaim, in one united voice, that they support public education and the teaching profession, and that they are determined to save both from those who seek to destroy them.

When the president of NYSUT, Dick Iannuzzi, began to address the crowd one of the first things he pointed out was a recent public statement made by State Education Commissioner John King who blamed our elected union officials for creating a "tense environment around assessments." King says that teachers are "concerned about being held accountable." So why would King put out a public statement so obviously and patently false? I believe it is because the public is beginning to understand that 10 years of failed education policy under NCLB and RTTT are not improving the education that our children are receiving. They are beginning to see that the only beneficiaries from 10 years of standardized testing are the testing industry, and perhaps those politicians receiving campaign contributions from business interests that want to keep public money flowing into their private coffers.

The keynote speaker at the rally was John Nichols who regularly writes for The *Nation* and often appears on the Ed Schultz Show on MSNBC. He said, "The current struggle to save public education is nothing less than a struggle to save our democracy in the United States." I agree with him. When the dollar becomes more powerful than the vote, and corporations can buy public policy and corrupt the political process, it is only through public education that students will learn the ways in which money destroys democracy. I am glad I attended the Rally on June 8. I hope to see 10 times as many defenders of public education at the next one.
