TILIGHT ON ARLINGTO

Arlington: a singular name that unites us all. But have you ever stopped to notice that our district's moniker is a bit...different than most of the other school districts in our area? Unlike many schools in Dutchess County, the name "Arlington" does not take its name from a particular area of residency. This name has undergone guite an evolution over time.

Originally, the area that we have come to know as Arlington was called Leetown, presumably named after Darius Lee, born in Fishkill. Lee moved to Poughkeepsie and embarked upon a number of successful business enterprises, including a general store, a carriage factory, and a hotel (The Bulls HEAD Inn).

Local residents in the 1700s would also refer to the area as Bulls HEAD, and it is uncertain as to why the second word was entirely capitalized. The two major industries of the time were livestock and brickmaking, and the growing area was very up-and-coming. So much so that, when a trolley line was proposed to run from downtown Poughkeepsie to the area where Vassar College is now located, it was decided that the name Bulls HEAD lacked a certain dignity, and so a third,

HEAD. The undeclared Cold War between the city of Poughkeepsie and the town may have had its origins in this question of names, as the Bulls HEAD inhabitants were prompted to challenge the unwelcome name with, "East of what?"

In the late 1800's the area in which our district began finally became recognized as "Arlington." Although it is uncertain, there are at least two theories as to why this particular name was chosen. In the post-Civil War period the name Arlington was a popular choice of many small towns across the nation. It may very well have been the National Cemetery in Virginia that inspired many new "Arlingtons" to appear across the reunited country.

Yet another opinion is that the name Arlington traces its origins back to colonial times, to Colonel William Cosby, who served as a colonial Governor of New York and whose lineage can be traced back to Isabella Bennet, 2nd Countess of (c'mon, take a guess now) Arlington!

So there you have it. A fairly detailed, and yet completely inconclusive, explanation for the name "Arlington." It matters not from whence our name came; what is singularly most important is that you, dear reader, have become a part of the history of the Arlington School District. May this legacy serve to inspire you to further its proud and rich heritage!

Where Does My Dues Money Go?

You may have noticed that the first paycheck in October began the year's deduction of your union dues. The dues that will be deducted from all full-time members for this school year will be \$855.26. Whenever money is travelling away from you it is natural to wonder "Where is that money going?" and

"What is it going to be used for?" and of course "What do I get?" I hope to be able to shed some light on these questions and help you see the good work that these dollars are doing on our behalf.

The total amount of dues deducted can be divided into three parts. NYSUT will keep \$358, the AFT gets \$218.76, and \$278.50 will stay here with the ATA. Our ATA portion has been spe-

cifically budgeted by our treasurer, Kathie Blank-Cicala (LMS). The ATA budget is presented to the executive council in the spring for analysis, discussion, and vote of adoption. The main items that our organization uses this money for are the mortgage and maintenance of our building and property, paying stipends to officers and committee chairs, and the salary of our part time administrative assistant. All of these expenses are subject to an internal audit performed annually by a committee of ATA members, as well as an external audit provided by an outside firm. As far as the NYSUT and AFT portions, we can easily find their financial statements

on their websites and see how money is spent as a reflection of the priorities of these organizations. But then, the question of "What do I get?" remains unanswered.

Belonging to a union provides a great deal of benefits. We all benefit by having our contract. You have peace of mind knowing your salary, benefits, and working conditions are established and defended. Even while our contract is expired, the

language continues to be in effect until a new settlement is voted in by you, thanks to the Triborough Amendment and union lobbying efforts.

Besides contractual protection, union membership also provides greater access to affordable healthcare. We have better access

to health and dental coverage than most members of the private sector due to our union membership and the participation of ATA president Bob Maier on the board of directors of the Dutchess Educational Health Insurance Consortium (DEHIC). Being a member of such a large labor organization provides group discounts for life, auto,

renters, and homeowners insurance, as well as consumer discounts on products and services including wireless phone service, car rentals, hotels, and more. Check out the member benefits sections at NYSUT.org and AFT.org to find some great deals.

Red, White, and Blue Jeans to Support Honor Flights

Our American military service personnel often return home to little fanfare, but one special organization called the Honor Flight Network is trying to recognize these heroes and they need our help.

Our district is sponsoring a dress down day to benefit Honor Flight on Tuesday, November 25. Founded in 2005, the Honor Flight Network provides WWII and Korean veterans an all expense paid tour of the War Memorials in Washington DC. Since its inception, the Honor Flight program has provided over 98,000 vets with an unforgettable experience free of cost.

Honor Flight Network is a non-profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their sacrifices. They transport our heroes to Washington, D.C. to visit and reflect at *their* memorials. Top priority is given to the senior veterans; World War II survivors, along with those other veterans who may be terminally ill.

The ATA is proud to support this organization, which at least two of its members have been personally affected by: Chris Shave (TIS) went with his grandfather, a WWII vet, and Eric Cline (LMS) was able to accompany his father, a Korean War vet, to Washington, DC. Both ATA members were privileged to travel with their veterans to Washington DC as part of the National Honor Flight Network- Leatherstocking Chapter.

"Many touching moments marked our trip, but seeing my grandfather thanked for his service by random visitors at the WWII monument brought tears to my eyes," said Shave, who describes

himself as a grandson of freedom. "Poppy has always been a proud veteran, but nothing could have matched the outpouring of patriotism that day!"

Cline also shared similar experiences on his trip. "The Patriot Riders Motorcyclist Club, many of which were Vietnam vets, led the procession to Albany. I was amazed by the outpouring of support at each of the stops on route to Washington DC. The public and members of the vet's families came out in droves to thank the vets for their service to our country. The vets were overwhelmed with their reception," he said. "When we arrived at the World War II Memorial, we were greeted by the 91 year-old former senator Bob Dole, himself a WWII veteran. We also visited the Iwo Jima Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery, and the Korean War Memorial and Vietnam Wall. It was an incredible experience for my father and I."

The Honor Flight Hudson Valley Branch needs our help as all vets' expenses are raised through fundraising events such as the ATA's Red, White, and Blue Jeans.

They protect the right to arbitrate grievances in court and enforce arbitration decisions made in your favor. The ATA is also provided with a labor relations specialist who has extensive experience and expertise in workplace issues.

Finally, if you have not yet

been convinced that your union dues money is working hard for you every day, let me remind you of the ATA Welfare Trust that provides our dental plan, personal health expense coverage, and vision expense coverage, which in themselves more than return your dues directly to you through this negotiated set of ATA managed benefits.

I know many members understand and appreciate the value of

union membership. Some of you may not have been aware of the full spectrum of support that we gain as a result of belonging to these organizations. I also know as well as you do that the last few years have been tough on unions and union members, but I still feel as though the money I spend on my union dues is one of the hardest working investments in our future.
