fended and even condoned in the media as a part of the campaign process.


So please, next time you see inflammatory talk being made light of on tv or online think about the fact that your students are seeing this too, and some of them are even members of groups

Welfare Trust Questions Answered

What is Welfare Trust?

The Welfare Trust provides ATA members with reimbursements for out-of-pocket personal health, dental, and vision expenses. Dependents, spouses, and domestic partners are also covered. Enrolled families are entitled to \$2750 in dental benefits per family member, \$325 in vision benefits, and \$400 in personal health benefits, per year.

What are the starting and ending dates for each Welfare Trust account?

Dental: Jan. 1 – Dec. 31 Vision: Oct. 1 – Sept. 30 Personal Health: Oct. 1 – Sept. 30

What are some examples of eligible expenses?

Some examples of items that members can be reimbursed for are co-pays, over-the-counter FDA-approved drugs, eye examinations, contact lenses, crutches, substance abuse treatment, and even home improvements for medical purposes.

How can I get reimbursed for my eligible expenses?

A reimbursement form can be found on the ATA website for personal health and vision benefits. The completed form, along with applicable receipts, must be mailed to the address found on the form. Dental benefits will be applied directly at your dentist's office.

If I get reimbursed from my FLEX plan can I still get the money from the Personal Health Account of the Welfare Trust?

Yes. Paying with your FLEX plan money is no different than paying directly from your own pocket. Just submit the receipt with the Personal Health Account Form.

Are there any dentists that accept the ATA payment in full?

Yes. There is a list of participating dentists on the ATA website. Call the dentist office and ask if they accept the Arlington Teachers' schedule administered by Preferred as full payment before you make

your first appointment.

How is the value of the payment determined for the Dental if I go to other than a participating dentict?

A monetary value is assigned to each dental code. There is a list of payment values at the ATA Office. Welfare Trust Representatives in each building have a copy. The American Dental Association does not permit us to make a general distribution of their codes. At one point we had the values on our website, but the ADA insisted we take them off the site.

I signed up for health insurance; do I also have to sign up for the Welfare Trust?

Yes. You must fill out the enrollment/change form found on the ATA website. Send the completed form through the interschool mail to Ron Higgins, ATA Office.

Meet the ATA's New Chief Negotiator

After 15 years as the ATA's Chief Negotiator, Donna Doerrier has stepped down in preparation for her retirement at the end of the 2016-2017 school year. The ATA Executive Council voted at its June meeting to appoint Robert McHugh as her replacement, effective immediately. McHugh, a social studies teacher, has been a member of the negotiating team, representing the high school, for the past 10 years. In addition, he has served as the Political Action Co-Chair, and on committees dealing with APPR, grievances, and communications. He answered some questions about the state of our contract and his new role as Chief Negotiator.

When does our current contract expire? When will negotiations begin again?

The current contract expires at

the end on this school year, in July 2017. Typically, the team begins preparing for a new round of negotiations in the fall and winter before the expiration of the contract. This work includes soliciting ideas and contract proposals from members and examining the details of other recently settled contracts in the region. We then exchange proposals with the district in the spring and commence the negotiating process in earnest.

Who comprises the negotiating team? How are the members chosen?

The negotiating team includes the ATA President, Bob Maier, the Chief Negotiator, and representatives from each level; elementary, middle and high school. However, because both Bob and I both teach at the high school, we intend to have another representative from one of the other levels instead of a third high school member. The final composition of the team - chosen by the Chief Negotiator and President and voted on by the Executive Council - has not been finalized yet, but should be in place by the first Executive Council meeting of the year in September.

What is the guiding philosophy of the negotiating team?

I believe that one of the most

important things we can do as a negotiating team is to move inexorably in the direction of treating everyone equally. This includes elementary, middle, and high school teachers, but it also includes men and women and young teachers and veterans. In every negotiation that I have been a part of the District has made proposals designed – intentionally or not - to divide us. These proposals would have limited the salary growth of young teachers or dictated when and how often women could take child rearing leave. This is precisely the reason why unions exist - to ensure that, as the old credo goes, "an injury to one is an injury to all," that we are all in this together.

What are you most proud of negotiating during your time on the team?

The best provision that we were able to negotiate during my time on the team was child rearing leave for adoptive parents. Because of that language, parents who adopt a child are now contractually entitled to the same paid time off that all other new parents have.

What is your biggest frustration with the negotiations process?

Being constantly reminded of the limits of rationality.


