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A Year of Relative Calm Comes to an End

As I look back on the 2016 -17 school year it seems to me that this was a relatively calm year for Arlington. Since the inception of this newsletter in 2010 its June headlines

have reflected a great deal of upheaval for Arlington educators: June 2011—"A Year Full of Changes Comes to an End" talked about the closing of LaGrange Elementary School and working under a new superintendent.

June 2012 — "We Have a Contract!" reflected on the fact that over the course of two long years of negotiations the ATA team met with three different superintendents.
June 2013 — "One Voice Unites Educators" reported on the huge rally that took place in Albany to fight back against Pearson and corporate education reform.

June 2014 — "AMS Prepares to Enter a New Chapter" reminisced about the middle school in the face of its closing and the moving of the Arthur S. May school into its building.

Let's not become complacent though, and be on the lookout for ways to band together to fight for what is right in the field of education.

<u>June 2015</u> — "E Pluribus Unum" discussed the onslaught of assaults on the education profession.

June 2016 — "Relaxation, Recuperation, Registration" informed teachers that they now must register with State Ed. in order to keep their licenses.

Now, in June 2017, we have a signed memorandum of agreement with the district that was complete before our

current contract ran out, we have the same superintendent for a few years in a row, we haven't closed any school buildings, and we have no new state laws regarding edu-

cation. On the local level, things are good. Then I remember that Betsy DeVos is Secretary of Education, and we still have the state laws about APPR, and the tax cap, and charter schools. Have we gotten so

used to tumult in Education that these things are the new norm? I hope not. Please, congratulate our negotiating team on their great work, and relax this summer knowing that your job conditions are stable. Let's not become complacent though, and be on the lookout for ways to band together to fight for what is right in the field of education.

NY State Constitutional Convention — Is It a Big Deal?

The last time that New York State voters said yes to a constitutional convention was in 1965 when a convention committee was established by the state legislature. 186 people were elected (1966) to become members of the state's 9th Constitutional Convention. On November 7, 1967, over 70 percent of voters in the state rejected the proposed constitutional changes . The total cost

to New York tax payers in 1967 was approximately 15 million dollars. It is estimated that holding a constitutional convention today would cost tax payers anywhere between 47 and 108 million dollars, depending on the make up of the delegates elected as representatives.

In November of this year, voters will be asked to vote yes or no on holding a new Constitutional Convention here in the state of New York. Those in support of holding a convention have three main arguments.

They argue that:

- It is a chance once and for all to curb the corruption in Albany by setting term limits and further restricting the state's power.
- The current legislative process in Albany does not move quickly enough.
 Through the process of holding what supporters want to call a 'People's Constitutional Convention', the general public will be able to force lawmakers to take actions that they are otherwise unwilling to take.

 The current constitution is deficient in the rights that it guarantees to the public.
 There is a long list of rights that our current constitution does not guarantee to all New Yorkers, including the right to: adequate health care, clean air and water, equal rights for women and the LGBT community, force term limits on elected officials, early vot-

ing, independent redistricting... and the list goes on.

Those in opposition to a Constitutional Convention argue that:

- There is a more effective and less costly way to change our constitution through the public referendum process, a process that has successfully amended the constitution more than 200 times.
- The same Albany legislators who are currently paid to represent our interests in

Albany would most likely be voted in to act as the delegates to what the opposition wants to call a 'Politician's Constitutional Convention'. Those legislators would then be entitled to a double salary for the entire length of the convention proceedings, and they would most likely continue to represent big business and anti labor interests, not

the interests of grass roots coalitions.

- Dangerous decisions could be made because of the unlimited scope of what could be changed. New Yorkers could lose the right to: a free public education, Workers' Compensation benefits, union association and collective bargaining.
- The state constitutional requirements regarding public pensions and social welfare programs could also be placed in jeopardy.

As the debate for and against a constitutional convention heats

up over the summer months and into the Fall, it behooves all of us to educate ourselves and our families in order to actively participate in this important debate. The consequences of voter inattention and apathy in this matter could have dire consequences for the future of our own families and the families of the children that we educate in our public schools.


