your life and refresh your spirit.



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
Member Organizers Spread the Word

Not only was I given the opportunity to meet some inspiring people this constitutional convention summer, I even got paid for the privilege. In June NYSUT put out a call look- tion, the people that I ing for people interested in joining what was billed as an Education Summer-Member Organizing Insti-

tute. I sent in an application laying out my union bona fides and expressing an interest and was quickly asked to join the program.

After three days of training. I set out along

with 60 other NYSUT members to talk with our union brothers and sisters in communities throughout the state. Together we knocked on 33,097 doors. We talked with 8,419 teachers and other service related professionals. We placed 3,123 VOTE NO signs in yards from Long Island to Buffalo and got 7,508 commitments to vote no on a

ballot question asking whether to hold a new for New York State.

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> They thanked me personally for taking the time to do the summer work and spoke in positive terms about their own local contracts that guarantee wages and benefits, allows them some collective spent part of our summer say in working conditions, and protects their right to advocate for programs and services that meet the needs of their students.

If there was a common complaint, it concerned inadequate funding levels that lead to larger case loads for some counselors and therapists, and standardized testing and the constraints that the current standardized testing places on a teacher's time, creativity and professional autonomy. Otherwise our fellow union members reported that their individual locals are strong and that they feel well represented by their local leadership. While some conversations that I had were somewhat brief and to the point, I also had many conversations with people whose passion for the work that they do as educators left me feeling invigorated and even more proud to be a part of what I have al-

> wavs considered a noble profession.

Our union is well on its way toward reaching an ambitious goal that was set at the yearly NYSUT Representative Assembly this last

spring. The goal was to have a one-on-one conversation with each of the more than 650,000 NY-SUT members across the state within the next year. Those of us who as member organizers made a good start.

Hudson River Sloop Clearwater

On August 1, Liz Jordan, Janice Rifenburg, and Eileen Snook from Beekman Elementary and I got to sail on the sloop Clearwater in Beacon. They offered a free program for educators to learn more about the environment of the Hudson River and how we can use field trips on the Clearwater with students. They taught us about things like plastic pollution, the history of the Hudson, Hudson river fish, and how to see how much oxygen is in the water.

Nicaraguan Mission

I went to Nicaragua for a week in July with North Country Mission of Hope, a humanitarian organization based in Plattsburgh. Mission Esperanza, as it's known in Nicaragua, supports families in the Chiquilistagua area, outside of Managua. Part of that support is maintenance on the schools. I did a lot of painting, both the interior and exteriors of schools. I also helped build shelving units for several classrooms. There are 11 barrios, (neighborhoods) in the Chiquilistagua area where the poorest of the poor live. We went into the neighborhoods, distributed some food (rice and beans) and made sure the people in the neighborhoods know about the clinic and other services available at Mission Esperanza.

Mission of Hope also receives food grants from Save My Starving Children and Stop Hunger Now. They provide daily meals to over 6,500 children in 20 schools and help the schools create the infrastructure needed to store and cook the food. I helped out at the ribbon cutting ceremony at a school that was newly implementing the feeding program. I also participated in an annual birthday party for orphaned children with HIV and got to visit the 3 children I sponsor to attend school. -Eileen Snook, BES

Giulia became a part of our family right away. We treated her like our own, having family dinners, expecting homework completed, good grades, and chores. She came in to visit my American elementary classroom. We made college visits to our children for family weekends. She was involved in many Arlington High School activities, such as track and French Club, as well as the International Student club. Giulia fit right in with extended family during holidays. We took her to many historical sites; FDR Estate, Vanderbilt Mansion, Walkway Over the Hudson, etc., as well as many trips to NYC. We had a lot of fun. It was extremely hard to say goodbye.

Five years later, in July 2017, my husband and I were able to visit her hometown of Turin, Italy. Her family invited us to stay with them. They were very grateful for the amazing experience we gave Giulia and wanted to show us around their hometown and other parts of Italy. Back in Turin we saw many basilicas and piazzas. We also did a lot of everyday things like dinners at home, pizza out, walk dogs, walk the mall etc. It was amazing to see her in her element. Our families have so much in common. Our life changed forever! We now have family in Italy!
