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### Be a Part of the Conversation

I don't know about you, but when I decided to become a teacher I never considered that I would be entering a career where I was not only responsible for the intellectual well-being of children, but possibly for their literally being

at all. Teaching was not supposed to be life or death. I now have been forced to imagine what I would do if someone came to my classroom with the intent to murder me and my students. That makes me angry.

And it makes me feel sad, and powerless. Most of the decisions made about how to best keep me and my students safe are made without my involvement—without the involvement of any teachers. There is the national discussion about gun control centered in Washington D.C., but there is also the discussion

about school safety on the local level. In Arlington a hired consultant is tasked with making plans for potentially lethal eventualities, and our school board decides how much funding to provide for the supporting infrastructure,

Even if we don't all agree on how to best manage the complexities of school safety, at least we have now made our opinions known.

and whether more staffing is needed. I sit at school board meetings where all of these things are discussed and I listen to students and parents voice their opinions at the microphone, but teachers are prohibited from being a part of that conversation.

That's where the ATA comes in. We have the power to act together to have our

voices heard. We can start our own conversation, and when 700 of us talk it is hard to ignore. In these pages you will find the results of a school safety survey given to ATA members. Maybe it's just because I'm a science teacher,

but I found comfort in being able to collect and analyze data and gain some knowledge of where my fellow teachers stand on the issues at hand. Even if we don't all agree on how to best manage the

complexities of school safety, at least we have now made our opinions known. Maybe the real comfort is in seeing that I'm not alone in this time of unrest in the schools, and in knowing that the ATA has provided a venue for you to not be alone either. Let's make sure to continue the conversation.

## **Arguments Heard In Janus Case**

On February 26 the U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments in the case Janus v. American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME). At the core of the issue at hand is whether a union can charge dues for services provided. This case is working to overturn the

Abood v. Detroit Board of Education case of 1977 in which the Supreme Court ruled that

public employee unions can charge an agency fee. An agency fee is a payment for services that the union provides for an individual who doesn't want to join the union.

As the Janus case was heard by the court last month we can now understand the premise of the argument. On the side of Janus, the parties argued that this issue is a matter of the First Amendment. The issue at hand is whether a union has the right to charge fees for services like collective bargaining, fair representation, and benefits. Janus is a public employee who has not joined the union. Up until now he has been charged an agency fee for services, as he has declined joining the union and paying dues. It is important to understand that unions have a duty of fair representation to all workers of

> a bargaining unit. This has been true since the National Labor Relations act of 1935, which the Abood case upheld in 1977.

Now the Janus team has argued that fair share agreements violate workers' right to free speech. They believe this because the union may contribute to political campaigns that they may not believe in or support. We will keep you posted as we expect a ruling on this case before the end of this term of the Supreme Court in June.

Currently the Arlington Teachers' Association has 100% participation, with no agency fee payers. As we have enjoyed the strong support of our membership, we will be looking for your continued support into the future. Our Local has been successful in tackling major issues, settling contracts,

> and extending significant benefits. If our members decided that they no longer wanted to be part of the union, it could jeopardize

what we all enjoy in our jobs. All of the contractual protections and benefits could be in jeopardy, and our profession would be significantly undermined.

As we are informed of the Supreme Court's ruling in June we will keep you informed about what our next course of action will be. We hope to weather this storm like we have in the past, standing together, and facing the challenge head on. Please contact me at the ATA office if you have any questions.

# Act Now To Help End APPR

I recently had the pleasure of representing the ATA in several meetings with elected officials. On February 4, I attended the NYSUT Legislative Luncheon in Kingston where teachers from the Hudson Valley had the opportunity to speak with local elected officials and their representatives. I was seated at a table with a staffer from Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney's office. All of us at the table shared our views and needs with the staffer. In our conversation, I mentioned that while there was much national discussion about roads and bridges in the debate about infrastructure, there also needs to be a focus on educational infrastructure due to the age of many schools. I was assured that my concerns would be communicated to

Congressman Maloney.

More recently, on March 6, I lobbied in Albany as part of NYSUT's Committee of 100. We spoke to Assemblywoman Didi Barrett, Assemblyman Kieran Lalor, and Senator Sue Serino. During those meetings a number of issues were addressed including charter schools and the executive budget proposal. We also discussed a lack of financial and staffing resources to help our students who have mental illnesses. Our primary focus; however, was on the return of teacher evaluations to local control. While in those meetings, I argued that the APPR system, as it currently exists, drains time and money from the districts, which means that administrators have less time during the school day to focus

on basic school safety and discipline. My fellow representatives from other districts echoed those sentiments and all three legislators agreed that teacher evaluations should be returned to local control and the state system should be scrapped.

We now have the momentum to end APPR and need to act before the legislative session ends in June. Please take a few moments to write an email, make a phone call, or send a letter to your legislators urging them to end APPR. You can always make an appointment with them at their district office to deliver the message in person. If we all make a concerted effort, we can end this needless burden.




# . .The Results Are In

In an effort to continue the conversation on school safety going on all around us, The Educator asked ATA members to answer the following survey questions and to add their comments. Two hundred forty three of the ATA's 710 members, evenly distributed throughout the grade levels, answered the poll. This results in a 95% confidence level with a 5% margin of error.

Of the 243 survey responses, 69 included a comment. While only a select few of those comments are published here, all were shared with administration. All ATA voices deserve to be heard.







"All students should be required to wear an ID, have to enter & exit through specific doors, and should not be able to walk around the building before a certain time. As one student said at 6:45 a.m. as he walked into my classroom, 'anyone with a backpack can get in, no one even looks at you."


"I would like to see cameras with someone monitoring the cameras at all times. Safety committee has discussed the same concerns for years and nothing has been done. It's disconcerting."


Overall, 45% of all respondents either agreed or strongly agreed with the statement, 27% felt neutral, and 28% either disagreed or strongly disagreed.

"While I do feel safe at school, I think our system is broken in terms of resources available to students we feel, as professionals, are at-risk. Oftentimes, the go-to places such as IDT or other similar programs are full or do not feel a student is a good fit. That student then ends up coming back to our school with the same red-flags, and it is nearly impossible to get the help the student needs."

#### I feel safe at work.


"I feel most unsafe on hall duty. Large groups of students enter and leave gym and lunch late or early. Students familiar with these loose procedures, along with unmanned doors that could be used as entry points, are a concern."






Overall, 49% of all respondents either agreed or strongly agreed with the statement, 27% felt neutral, and 24% either disagreed or strongly disagreed.

#### Arming teachers would help to increase the safety of our schools.



Overall, 9% of all respondents either agreed or strongly agreed with the statement, 9% felt neutral, and 82% either disagreed or strongly disagreed.



"Security should be armed as well as any teacher who already carries or has a license and there are many on staff who carry outside of school."


"Not just arming teachers, but arming the right teachers."

"What I really think we need are fewer guns."

"I'm sure that some teachers are proficient and have gun permits, but I would have a lot of concerns about how that would be put into practice.

Our safety personnel are mainly retired police officers, detectives, troopers, etc., all of whom are trained in firearms and carried a gun for their entire law enforcement career. These men and women should be allowed to be armed to protect our students, should there be an emergency. There is no need to arm teachers, we have plenty of personnel who are trained, qualified and comfortable being armed."

### If I had to choose one area to augment in order to increase school safety at Arlington it would be:



"Our needs should be met according to building and ageappropriate needs, not uniform ideas. The elementary schools do not need hallway cameras, but we do need specific training, personnel to address safety issues, and support for children who we feel are on the brink." Overall, 37% of all respondents chose infrastructure improvements, 33% chose increased mental health personnel, 22% chose increased safety personnel, and 9% chose more mental health training.

When the fire alarm went off at LMS last week. We honestly didn't know if we should leave our classrooms. I've never felt so unsafe as I did that day walking out into the open field. Everyone was so relieved when we found out it was burnt popcorn! It highlighted the need for updated procedures and better communication. I don't want our schools to turn into bunkers, but we do need to invest in making our schools safer both with personnel and with improved planning and infrastructure. The real solutions are outside of the school - we really need strong gun control laws and real interventions when people are red flags whether due to social media posts, domestic violence, violence towards animals or other warning signs."
