APPR Efforts Stall

Over the last few months there was some momentum amongst NY-SUT and its local affiliates towards getting the state government to alleviate the testing component of APPR. Many members of the New York state assembly and the New York state senate were supportive of our efforts and a bill to that end passed the Assembly and is in the Senate. Your phone calls, emails and letters worked to great effect, so thank you for your efforts.

Unfortunately, the senate president, John Flanagan, has decided not to

call for a vote on that bill. Flanagan's reasoning is that the bill could, as he sees it, erase gains that have been made in education under the APPR process, and time needs to be taken to sort out all of the issues related to teacher evaluation.

Flanagan also champions his past work on the education committee. We all know that there has been plenty of time to overhaul the entire system and we have seen how disastrous the APPR process is for our schools. As a former member of the education committee,

Flanagan should be aware of the real challenges that face public education and be willing to help. To further stall the process, Flanagan recently introduced his own bill that would eliminate state testing as a component of APPR. Unfortunately, his bill also calls for a large increase in the number of charter schools. The state senate will likely pass the bill, but it will not pass the state assembly so we will be stuck in the same abysmal system for at least another year.

Membership Drive Continues

By now most, if not all, of our ATA members have been approached by another member to re-sign with the Arlington Teachers' Association. As the Supreme Court is due to provide a ruling on the Janus vs. AFSME case any day, we are working preemptively to re-sign our members in the event the court will require

This case has taken national attention to the realm of organized labor. What is at stake is whether a union can charge dues for someone who most of the contractual benedoes not want to join. First I would ask, why would someone not want to join? The ATA of the professional faculty are and NYSUT provide a superior members who pay dues to level of benefits and protection of our working conditions and salaries. Specifically, the ATA provides benefits that far outweigh the cost of our dues, mainly through the welfare

trust, representation by the officers day-to-day, and collective bargaining of con-

Up until now, a member who chose not to join could become an "agency fee" payer. What this means is that you would be charged the same amount as dues, but would not be a member. We are forecasting that this will be reversed, and individuals would be able to become a "free rider". This means an individual would be afforded fits and salary without paying dues. Currently all members the ATA, NYSUT, and the AF-T/NEA. Thank you for this.

With the ruling, would this change? I do not believe so. As I have had many conversations with members across

the district, we, the ATA, are a strong local, and our level of commitment proves that. As we compare with our neighbors, and those across the state, we are fortunate to have what we have. The years of work by our predecessors, and the continued service from the organization today is a testament to the importance of our union. Either on an individual basis, or as a collective, the ATA is here to support our members, and ensure we are treated fairly in our profession. This re -signing exercise should be the extent of our effort to continue as a vital organization in the Arlington Central School District, Please let any ATA officer or building representative know if you have any questions or concerns.

Summer Brings Mandatory Mail Order Prescriptions

There has been much conversation, and many questions about the Dutchess Educational Health Insurance Consortium's (DEHIC) decision to mandate mail order for maintenance medications. Many of you know I am a trustee on the DEHIC board, and I was a part of this decision that was made. There is no secret, the cost of pharmaceuticals are skyrocketing. To mandate mail order was an attempt to save money on the premium for both our members and the plan.

Both the Arlington district and Empire Blue Cross distributed information that explains how to enroll in the mail order program. If you or a dependent is on a maintenance drug (a drug every month over the year,) we will be asking you to transfer to mail order with Express Scripts. What this means is with either a phone call with the number on your insurance card, or online at EmpireBlue.com, one can

sign up for home delivery of medications. If you have difficulty doing so, please contact me at the ATA office, and I would be glad to walk



you through the process, or you can call the customer service number on your insurance card.

We understand that this has caused significant push-back by folks who enjoy their local pharmacy. To that end we have been working with many local pharmacies to contact Express Scripts provider services, and they can be af-

forded an opportunity to join their network as a point of service innetwork. Recently both Pine Plains Pharmacy, and McCarthy's Pharmacy in Stanfordville, have signed up to be considered in-network, and members can continue to use them for their maintenance drugs.

If you have a neighborhood pharmacy that you frequent, and would like this opportunity too, please ask the pharmacist to contact provider services at Express Scripts. If they need support on this end, I would suggest they contact Pine Plains or McCarthy's for support in completing this process. As I understand at this time, chain stores like CVS, Rite Aid, and Walgreens, are not interested in participating. Please let me know if this is incorrect.




33 years in Education, I leave Arlington with many wonderful memories and wish you all the best.
