upport the School Budget on May 21

This year's school budget vote will take place on Tuesday, May 21. The ballot will also include a bus and equipment proposition and three school board positions.

The support of every ATA member is vital to ensure a positive outcome to the budget process. If you do not live in the district it is important that you talk to your friends and family who do and encourage them to get out and vote on the 21st. Make sure to tell them why passage of the budget and the bus and equipment proposition is important to you and how they will benefit the children of this district.

In addition, offer to give them information

about the candidates for school board and explain why it is important for the success of the district to have people on the school board who are able to work with the employees of Arlington to further the educational opportunities that we offer. There are several qualified candidates running, and the ATA has carefully considered whom to endorse.

BUDGET FACTS

- A 2.15% tax levy increase is proposed, which is below the allowable 2.55% cap.
- If the budget fails twice, a contingency budget must be adopted, meaning that an additional \$3.8 million would have to be cut. That would require the elimination of new equipment purchases, and the reduction of positions, programs, and extracurricular activities, among other things.

BUS & EOUIPMENT PROPOSITION

Taxpayers are asked to permit the district to purchase new vehicles, trailers, and floorscrubbing machines at a local share of \$643,985 bonded over five years. The district maintains a schedule for bus replacements in order to provide cost predictability. If this proposition does not pass, more buses will likely need repairs as they get older, which could lead to cuts to educational programs to cover these additional costs.

SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

Five candidates are running to fill three seats on the Arlington School Board. The ATA recently interviewed all of the candidates and is endorsing Marion

Quinn, Kelly Cahill Chenski, and Mark Tornatore. We feel that these candidates show the most promise for making positive changes that will benefit the employees, students, and taxpayers of the district.

Rebuilding Our Community Together

On April 27, the ATA and Poughquag United Methodist Church (PUMC) once again teamed up to participate in National Rebuilding Day through Rebuilding Together Dutchess County. For their fifth year working together they worked to make much needed repairs on Mrs. Baker's home on Hillside

Lake Road in East Fishkill. The weather wasn't the greatest, but the turnout of support from the ATA was. The Bakers have lived in their home since 1974, where they raised seven children. In 2011 Mr. Baker died, making it more difficult for Mrs. Baker to maintain the home. Fast forward to 2019. Mrs. Baker is 79. and a new sun rises on her home where she can safely live.

The home, she said, has helped her keep her husband's memory alive, but she wants to make new memories too. Mr. Baker served in the Army in the late 1950's and Mrs. Baker keeps his

ashes and a folded American flag alongside her bed.

The ATA and the PUMC were able to install a new front and back door, new floors in both the kitchen and bathroom, and new second floor handrails, as well as make repairs to the ceiling in the living room, and the foundation. Addi-

tionally, we made repairs to the siding, installed new basement stairs, removed an old water heater, a new walkway was installed and probably a few more things were addressed that I don't know about because I was in the basement all day!

Each year the ATA's team has many returning veterans, and also a handful of new members. In total 150+ people volunteered for the National Rebuilding Day in Dutchess County and the ATA made up nearly 10% of them; a great accomplishment. Aside from the volunteers, the ATA also donated funds to help pay for the materials for the project. Author Visit Was a Labor of Love

It took LMS 6th grade teacher Suzanne Peterson about 10 months of working with a booking agent, and many follow-up calls, but she was finally able to secure a commitment for a visit to her school from author Jewell Parker Rhodes. Rhodes flew from San Diego to New York just to visit LMS on Wednesday, March 24.

A Dutchess County BOCES Arts in Education grant provided funds for the visit. While Peterson completed the necessary paperwork to secure the grant and did all of the scheduling, LMS' Arts in Education administrative representative Sharon LaDue had the duty of sending the necessary information along to BOCES. Each Arlington school has such a representative.

A significant reason for Rhodes' visit was that everyone at LMS had read her middle-grade novel, *Towers Falling*, two years ago and it has since become a tradition at LMS for all 6th graders to read the novel each fall.

The author spoke to all LMS 6th graders in two sessions, had a book signing session, and then a lunch with the author of make-your-own tacos catered by Salsa Fresca was provided for 18 students.

According to Peterson, Rhodes offered inspirational and empowering messages and personal stories and experiences for the students. The author shared that, "...one of the things about my books is that I may take you through horror, but I will always get you to affirmation, I will always take you to love, because that is the only way to live a good life, that is the only way to make our nation stronger. In children's literature, I define diversity as the celebration of unique characters, a celebration of their heritage and culture, and their exterior and interior selves with the deepest sense of empathy and humanity."

Rhodes also shared her belief that everyone should write, because it is through writing that we are able to more deeply understand ourselves and those around us. "Diverse books with compassion and empathy can reaffirm that we are all kin."
