for a Unity Pub and meet some new colleagues. With the world around us more divided than ever, let's make an effort to preserve our strength through unity.



APPR Process Altered

The APPR process for the 2019-20 school year has been changed following a series of discussions between the ATA's APPR committee, Deputy Superintendent Jonathan

Brown, and several district administrators. Representing the ATA were Greg Nieman (1st Vice President), Sam Falk (AHS), Kristine Jackson (LMS), Betsy Marshall (JDWR), and Bill Mueller (BES).

The student performance segment of APPR could not simply be

altered due to state law and the ATA's negotiated APPR plan, but some parts of the observation segment could be: the

district-required paperwork, and the number of Danielson components observed.

The impetus for considering these changes was that those aspects of the current system seemed to cause the most stress, and take up the most time, for teachers and

administrators alike. Going forward, there will be no required paperwork for any part of the observation. No lesson plan, no pre- or post-observation

forms, no artifacts. All of the items previously addressed in writing can now simply be discussed.

Slightly more challenging was made to use to work with was the Danielson rubric. We are

ensure that no teacher would be hurt by any proposed changes.

In the end, the decision Danielson's new organization of "clusters" to aid

> the process of narrowing-down which of the 22 components to use, rather than choosing individual components. The six clusters group the Danielson components by themes such as professionalism and engagement. After careful consideration, clusters two and five were chosen

What Is Changing:

- The number of Danielson components used for the announced observation
 - 10 instead of 22
- No more required paperwork for any part of the observation process, other than a confirmation that the process occurred
 - No lesson plan, pre- or postobservation forms, no artifacts

required to use it, but not to make up Arlington's all 22 components. Much discussion took place as to the minimum number of components that would

> In the coming month district administrators more training about the new APPR system, but in the meantime don't hesitate to email ataupdate@ gmail.com, or ask questions of any member of the ATA's APPR committee. The new APPR process will be reevaluated

before the end of the school year and feedback is appreciated.

What Is *NOT* Changing:

- The use of student test scores for APPR will be offering
- The number of observations
- The timing of observations, including the pre- and post-observation conferences
- All aspects of the unannounced observation
- The method of calculating the observation score and the overall APPR score

Danielson, Abridged

When preparing for your observation as part of the 2019-2020 APPR cycle, you will want to take a look at the slimmed-down list of Danielson components that you will be working with (see the previous page for the background on this). No changes have been made to the format of the rubric, with its "highly effective", "effective", "developing", and "ineffective" categories, but you won't be rated on 12 of the 22 components anymore.

Gone is the frustration with never scoring "highly effective" in the component about organizing physical space (2e) since your lab tables are attached to the floor, or having to explain that you really do want to do more professional development, but you have to get your kids off of the bus and can't stay after school (4e).

The following 10 indicators within Danielson's Cluster 2 and 5 are the sole components that comprise Arlington's announced observation rubric for the 2019-2020 school year. More details will be available in your school's common drive.



ATA Website Gets A Tune-Up

Twenty-one years ago I was approached by then ATA president Ron Higgins about the possibility of starting a website for the union. I had learned HTML in the Hudson User's Group, a local group of Mac enthusiasts, and thought I might be able to use those skills to help the ATA. I produced the first website a

year later, but soon revamped it. I discovered at the time that many of our members were still using dial-up modems and the

average screen size had a lower resolution than even the cheapest smartphones of today.

The ATA website 2.0 was leaner and faster, but not much to look at. About 10 years ago I rewrote the code for the website from the ground up, modernizing it quite a bit, with the added goal of making it easy to update.

Time marches on, and about

six months ago and I began jotting down ideas for a new update which would be nicer to look at and would format correctly for smartphones or tablets. With the arrival of summer vacation, I started reworking the website in earnest. I believe I've achieved most of my goals, but of course this is a

one convenient spot. Links are provided for all ATA forms, and contact information for all the union representatives and committee members. You can also see your union contract. A popular feature has always been the photo gallery, where we post pictures of every ATA event we can. For the sake of

faster load times, I do massage the files to make them smaller, so our members are welcome to write if there is a particular photo you'd like
