the ATA sponsored a dress-down day to support the Children's Home

of Poughkeepsie. TCH provides services for children who age in range from infancy to age 21 with their seven different programs. Their main goal is to reunite children with their families, but they also help with the fostering and adoption process as well. They provide, among many programs, mental health services, family classes, and social casework services. There are students right here at Arlington who are benefiting from the services TCH provides, and we are proud to support their efforts.

We are thrilled to report we were able to hold our Morning Movie fundraiser at the Hyde Park theater with a screening of Elf after a two year hiatus. We had over 350 people attend, and we raised over \$3000 for the Arlington Education Foundation.
