Member Spotlight: Euni Shim

Being new to Arlington hasn't stopped Overlook second grade teacher Euni Shim from getting involved with activities outside the classroom. Although only in her second year as a teacher, she is the coach of the Admiral Winterguard team at AHS. This competitive performance-based team for students in grades 8 through 12 incorporates choreographed dance, staging, and props accompanied by music. In the summer Shim also works with UVMS special education teacher Shannon Gilhuly (coach of the Cadet Winterguard for students in grades 5 through 8) on coaching the AHS marching band's color guard.

According to Shim, she has been active with color quard both competitively and professionally since 2014, and transitioned to coaching in 2017, never looking back. Her professional life even included a stint as a dancer on the Broadway show Aijiaak on Turtle Island for two years before becoming a teach-

seek out Arlington's marching band director Darrell Keech when she came to the district. Shim says, "I've always known about the Arlington Winterguard program for their accomplishments and accolades. After I accepted the job offer at Arlington, I asked to join the team. [Keech] introduced me to [color quard director] Albert Cousins and I have been here since! Marching band in the summer and fall and Winterguard in the winter and spring! It is a year round commitment!" She details that, "We spend about 13 hours a week rehearsing. During competition season, that number can get up to the 20+ hour range a week! And that's just when I'm with the students. There is a lot of planning and collaboration that happens behind the scenes as well. It's a huge time commitment for sure." Shim enjoys every minute of it: "I plan to work with the color guard for many, many years to come. It's a big part of my life and I wouldn't have it any

Tax Season Is Upon Us Once Again

When preparing your taxes, you may be able to deduct the union dues from your taxable income. Check with your tax preparation professional to be sure.

So how much did I pay in Union Dues (ATA+NYSUT/NEA+AFT) in 2022?

New employees (started in September)	\$358.50
Full time employees (worked last year also)	\$836.51
Recent retirees (Dues from last spring)	\$478.01

Are there any exceptions to this? Yes, a few people may have had a leave, or started after Sept. 1, or had some other payroll interruption that would change their deduction. See below to confirm your deduction.

The documentation you can provide to show that you have made these payments is on the "paystub" that was emailed to you on 12/22/22. I recommend keeping all of your paystubs, but the last one in each December is particularly handy when tax prep time comes.



Announcements

Did you know?

The educator expense tax deduction has increased for the first time since it was introduced in 2002! Eligible educators can now deduct up to \$300 (up from \$250) of qualified expenses paid in 2022. Spouses who are eligible educators filing jointly can deduct up to \$600 (up from \$500). To be eligible you must have worked at least 900 hours in a school during the school year.

Welfare Trust Updates:

Beginning January 1, 2023 dental benefits increased by 10% and a new hearing aid benefit went into effect. Coverage for hearing aids provides \$500 per family every 36 months for hearing aids, batteries, and adjustments.
