Spotlight On: Jaclyn Heeney

AHS librarian Jaclyn Heeney fewer children were being always wanted to have children, so when she found that she wasn't able to on her own, she decided to try another way. "I really felt like foster care was a good fit for me to have an alternative family," she says, "I also felt a calling to do it."

Heeney's first job as a librarian was in the Berkshire Union Free School District at a school for adjudicated youth. It was there, about 20 years ago, working with kids on PINS (Persons In Need of Supervision), that her interest in the foster care system was sparked. Since then she has worked in many different settings, though most of her career was at the elementary level. She has

now been at AHS for six years. Although Heeney attended a foster care orientation in Brooklyn many years ago, it wasn't until recently that she be-

came certified as a foster parent. This entailed steps like background and home safety checks, and 12 week MAPP (Model Approach to Partners in Parenting) training through Dutchess County Family Services. According to Heeney, the COVID era has been a difficult time for the foster care system. Although there was a surge in people like her signing on to be foster parents, because kids were not in school, and schools were the main source of calls to CPS (Child Protective Services),

placed in the foster care system. Many courts were also not in session.

Heenev received her first call to house children in June 2022. "I entertained the thought of two kids, and then didn't really think it through," she remembers. "I was waiting for so long, I said yes, and very guickly had a 2 year old and a 5 year old, brothers. It was really a whirlwind." Since Arlington currently does not offer leave for foster parents, Heeney had to ask for permission to use sick days to get the children settled in. She had the boys with her for about a month before they were sent to live with their grandmother.

The next September the call

came again. The boys weren't doing well with Grandma, but Heenev didn't feel that she was able to take them back at that time. The school year had just started and she didn't know how much leave she would be al-

lowed to take, so she had to decline. However, when she was approached again at Thanksgiving about the same kids, she couldn't say no, and she has had them with her ever since.

Heeney describes the most challenging part of the foster care process as trying to juggle her work responsibilities with very suddenly having young children placed in her care. Foster parents are not generally given the leave time that birth, or even adoptive, parents are.





"There's lots of ways people have families," Heeney states, "I just don't understand, why it is in our society in general that the value is given to the birth mother." Nevertheless, she has persevered, being fortunate to be able to use sick days to take most of December off when it was difficult to find daycare on short notice. Although it hasn't been easy, she says, "The kids are great. They're happy, and at the end of the day, that's why you do it."

Heeney encourages others to become foster parents. She credits AHS faculty members who have been through the foster parent system with mentoring her, and wants to pay it forward. There are many resources available for those who want to learn more, such as the NYS Office of Family Services website at https://ocfs.ny.gov/ programs/fostercare/ requirements.php, and even Facebook groups where foster parents share their experiences.

The conference was generously supported by the Adirondack Foreign Language Enhancement Fund at Adirondack Foundation. The conference was led by Comprehensible Input Guru, Mike Peto. In this workshop, Peto showed teachers how to put their students' lives in the center of their classroom and build class conversations from student ideas. He showed teachers how to take the stress out of planning and create the enjoyment of teaching as teachers focus on connections built with their students. Simeone enjoyed a full day of demonstrations of key activities and received a copy of Peto's book The Two Conversation Classroom plus a full year subscription to the CI Master Class, which has videos of demonstrations done in workshops, essays on how to use CI effectively without being a "Teacher Performer", and classready materials for World Language Teachers.
