Science

Literacy

Fourth grade teacher Brian Kimbark (BES) taught a graduate course for Mount Saint Marv College during the month of July. This was the graduate students' final class

before earning their masters in literacy. The graduate students took part in a summer reading program that Kimbark facilitated to tutor children at the Newburgh Armory Unity center in literacy.

Local History

AHS social studies teacher Robert McHugh is giving a talk at the Millbrook Historical Society's monthly meeting on September 21 at 7pm at Millbrook Library. All are welcome to attend to hear about the Anthony family, a Black family whose life in Millbrook from the late 1800's on has been uncovered through artifacts.

Social Studies

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AHS social studies teacher Lauren Collet-Gildard (pictured second row from top, third from right, with American University students) is a part-time visiting professor at Bard College. This summer she worked with students in Kyrgystan as part of a relationship that Bard has with their university. She describes:

"The American University of Central Asia, located in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan, offers an MAT program to English teachers in the region, and graduates acquire a Master's degree in teaching with a concentration in either literature, mathematics, or social studies. For the last three years I have worked remotely as a supervisor for these students, and quided them as they conducted their own empirical research, and this summer I was invited to work with the program in person.

As we closed our school year at Arlington on a Friday, I had only two days to prepare for my journey to Kyrgyzstan, by way of Istanbul. This small country is located deep in Central Asia, and lies along the ancient Silk Road in about the history of Kyrgyzstan, the Tian Shan Mountains. I learned guite a lot about the local population and culture, with its

mix of Kygryz and Uyghur people, among several other ethnic groups from the surrounding areas. I'm addition, there has always been an existing population of Russians due to its former ties to the Soviet Union, but only recently has this population increased; those

who are opposed to the war with Ukraine look to wait out the conflict in a friendly and inexpensive place.

While I was in Bishkek, I taught a five-day module on social studies methods, and we centered our discussion on what we mean by social studies. As students worked on lesson plans that could incorporate social studies into their language lessons, I learned a great deal and the shared values of my students. In addition, I had several students from Afghanistan, and

others from neighboring Tajikistan and Kazakhstan. The conversations around history and culture were robust, and we had many heated debates about the state of education in each of the countries, and each of these students' efforts to connect with students.

If anyone is thinking about visiting Kyrgyzstan, they should absolutely take the opportunity. It is an absolutely beautiful country, with warm and interesting people. The food is incredible and there are many outdoor activities and cultural adventures to be had."



Mission Work

AHS science teacher Kristy Zukswert (pictured, fourth from right) reports: "Members from my church and I spent a week in Guatemala working with the organization, Living Water: Adopt a Child. The organization has operations both in Guatemala and Albania to help sponsor, feed, and provide medical & dental care to children in need, while also sharing the word and love of God. During our time in Guatemala our missions team fed, prayed for, and served upwards of 1,500 children, single mothers, and elderly over the course of 6 lunch programs at 5 different locations throughout Guatemala. In addition to the feeding programs, we donated numerous articles of clothing, shoes, and school supplies and had the privilege to sponsor children ourselves. This trip was truly life changing and was a testament to the transcending power of love and faith.
