Did you know that you can submit Welfare Trust claims through email?

Welfare Trust Basics

Up-to-date information about Welfare Trust benefits, including printable forms, is always available at arlingtonteachers.com

Benefits At-A-Glance:

As a reminder, the Welfare Trust is part of members' contracted benefits and does not cost active members anything to be enrolled (or to enroll dependents).

Your benefits include:

- Yearly vision reimbursement of \$375 per family
- Yearly personal health reimbursement of \$425 per family
- Yearly dental coverage at a maximum of \$3,000 per family member. Dental reimbursements are determined by dental codes set by the American Dental Association. If you have questions about how much a given procedure will cost, you can call the ATA Office for information.
- Hearing Aid reimbursement of \$500 per family available every 36 months

The plan years for Vision and Personal Health run from October 1 – September 30. The Preferred Group allows a 3-month grace period to submit claims from the previous year (so you have until Dec. 30 to submit claims from Oct. 2023 through Sept 2024).

The Dental plan year runs on a calendar year from January through December.

Making Claims:

The Preferred Group has let us know that they are happy to receive claims digitally, via email at claims@tpgplans.com (simply attach scanned copies of your form and receipts) or via the PG Blue Portal at mytpgplan.com. Detailed instructions for submission via email are available from the ATA Office if you need them.

Please note that claims sent via US Mail should be mailed to the Albany address on each form (*Arlington Teachers' Association c/o The Preferred Group, PO Box 15136, Albany, NY 12212-5136).* Be sure to make and keep a copy of any claims you submit.

Important Details:

When a dependent child reaches the age of 19 and is a full-time student, you must submit a *Dependent Student Form*, and resubmit the form <u>every year</u> the dependent is a student. As long as a dependent child is a student, they are eligible for benefits until the end of the year in which they turn 25 years old.

If you have a change of address, name change, or change in dependents (including spouse) please be sure to download a *Welfare Trust Enrollment Form* from the website and submit your change. You can send the form inter-office to the ATA Office or email ata4547002@aol.com

You have until Dec.30 to submit claims from Oct. 2023 through Sept. 2024.



Shook's Books

Second grade teachers nationwide who subscribe to Scholastic News will get to enjoy monthly book pairings called "Shook's Books" courtesy of ASM second grade teacher Julie Shook. Shook, a long-time fan of Scholastic, News, contacted the magazine last December looking for some preprints. She describes, "Unfortunately that wasn't possible, but I was put in touch with the editors and creators of the magazine. They asked to virtually join a Scholastic News lesson in my classroom, which I call "Non-Fiction Friday", to see how I incorporated the magazine and online features into my reading workshop. When we debriefed after the lesson I talked about how many of my students often lack background knowledge and how pairing a related read-aloud text has helped to build their background knowledge. The folks at Scholastic News thought that other teachers could use my paired texts as a resource & "Shook's Books" was born. I have signed a contract and am a paid freelance contributor for the magazine."

Simeone Saves Student

I encourage my students to take the babysitter CPR course. It's not necessary to be a babysitter, but the training is different for the given age and may save their little brother or sister's
